Project management is rarely a one-size-fits-all approach. While many projects share similarities, each has unique nuances that require specific handling. Project tailoring involves deliberately customizing the project management method, governance, and processes to better suit the environment and the work involved.

Tailoring a project provides both direct and indirect benefits to the organization. It results in more effective and efficient project execution, fosters commitment from team members involved in customizing the approach, boosts stakeholder satisfaction, and reduces waste by cutting unnecessary processes and documentation.

The tailoring process begins by selecting a development and delivery approach, tailoring it to the organization's needs, tailoring it to the project's specific requirements, and then implementing ongoing improvements.

Select the initial development approach

Project teams apply their knowledge of the product, delivery schedule, and awareness of the available options to discover the best approach for the project. A suitability filter tool helps project teams consider whether a project should use a predictive, hybrid, or adaptive approach. Once the approach is selected, it should be tailored to meet the specific requirements of the project.

Tailor for the organization

Projects should be adjusted according to organizational standards. The project team should evaluate the required level of approval and oversight, as outlined in the organization's project methodology, along with any additional constraints, such as projects conducted under contract. The size of the project and the organization's maturity will also influence how much customization is appropriate.

Tailor for the project

Tailoring a specific project involves considering attributes that influence it, such as size, complexity, and the project's importance to the organization. Project teams assess how the product/deliverable, the team, and the culture affect how the project can be tailored.

Implement Ongoing Improvement

The tailoring process is not a one-time task. Engaging the project team while refining its processes can foster a sense of ownership and show a commitment to improvements and quality. The team should regularly review and adjust the tailoring process to stay aligned with the project's progress.

Tailoring project plans involves making intentional choices to align the project management approach with the specific context of each project, leading to better outcomes and higher chances of success. Regular reviews, such as retrospectives or lessons learned, are effective ways to assess whether strategies are working well and if improvements are needed.
